
SUPPORT FUNDING

Support funding is provided by the Board of County Commissioners for those activities for which costs do not apply solely to any specific County department's function, but are either applicable to the operation of county government as a whole, or are provided for the public good. Included within Support Funding are various Special Dependent Districts such as the Public Library Cooperative, Palm Harbor Recreation and Library, and Feather Sound Community Services Agency which rely upon the general taxing powers of the Board of County Commissioners to levy an ad valorem tax. These ad valorem taxes, approved by voter referendum, are levied upon properties within their respective districts to provide specific amenities. Also included with Support Funding are the costs associated with the County's self-insurance program, the County's vehicle replacement, and the County's employee benefits program. No County employees are associated with Support Funding entities. The County employees responsible for the administration of these various programs are presented as part of either the County Administrator's section or in the Independent Agencies' section.

DRUG ABUSE TRUST

Description

The Drug Abuse Trust provides financial assistance grants for qualified local drug abuse treatment and education programs. The Drug Abuse Trust was established by the Board of County Commissioners as a separate depository for additional assessments imposed by the courts in criminally punishable drug cases, which are collected by the Clerk of the Circuit Court.

EMPLOYEE LIFE AND HEALTH BENEFITS

Description

Employee Life and Health Benefits account for the costs associated with medical benefits, life insurance, and short term disability for County employees. The cost of these self-insured benefits are funded through an internal service fund established for the purpose of administering the County's comprehensive coverage for employees. The Employee Life and Health Benefits Fund is administered by the Human Resources Department, whose budget is listed under Independent Agencies.

Effective in FY08, the reserve for accrued liabilities represents the County's cumulative funding for Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB) obligations per GASB 45 requirements.

Excluding Reserves, the FY11 Budget reflects an increase of \$7,170,190 or 16.4%, There were no program reductions for FY11.

Personal Services expenses increased \$7,073,460 or 17.5%. Operating Expenses increased \$96,730 or 3.0%. Reserves decreased \$4,022,260 or 11.0%.

FEATHER SOUND COMMUNITY SVCS DISTRICT

Description

The Feather Sound Community Services District is a special taxing district within unincorporated Pinellas County. This special taxing district was formed by the residents of Feather Sound. It was established for the purpose of providing street lighting and the acquisition, development and maintenance of recreational areas and green space for the residents of Feather Sound. The services are funded by ad valorem taxes. Property owners within the district are levied a separate millage for this purpose.

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Analysis

Excluding reserves, the FY11 Budget reflects a decrease of \$26,000 or 16.2% from the FY10 Revised Budget. The FY11 payment to the Feather Sound Community Services District is \$124,000, a decrease of \$26,000 or 17.3% from the FY10 Budget. This reflects reduced revenue resulting from a 13.9% decrease in taxable value for the district as a result of lower market values. The District will maintain operating service levels by drawing down excess reserves in the District non-profit entity's accounts.

The FY11 Budget encompasses grounds maintenance, street lighting and irrigation, boardwalk and recreation area maintenance, and administrative expenses. The projected \$217,490 reserve at the end of FY11 will support future capital improvements or renovations of Feather Sound facilities.

FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICTS

Description

Fire protection is provided to the unincorporated areas of Pinellas County through 12 separate dependent fire protection districts. Services are provided by the municipalities of Belleair Bluffs/Largo, Clearwater, Dunedin, Largo, Pinellas Park, Safety Harbor, South Pasadena, Tarpon Springs, St. Petersburg/Gandy, St. Petersburg/Tierra Verde, HighPoint/Largo-Pinellas Park and Seminole Fire Departments in accordance with established contracts. Service is funded by Ad Valorem taxes collected from property owners in the districts.

Note: Pinellas County utilizes a budgetary framework referred to as "Pro-rate" in the Fire District budgets. This budget convention allows for centralized departmental services to be budgeted for in one cost center with the actual costs being allocated to the specific users of the service in other cost centers. This is technically accomplished by appropriating a negative amount equal to the total central departmental service, which eliminates "double counting." An allocation of the central service's total appropriation is then budgeted in each of the user cost centers, thereby reflecting the total actual cost to that particular function.

Belleair Bluffs/Largo: The FY11 split is 36.08% incorporated and 63.92% unincorporated. As of the FY10 Budget, Belleair Bluffs contracts with the City of Largo for fire suppression services. Using the unincorporated percentage of 63.92% applied against the District request of \$617,151, the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$394,480. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$240,970 plus the unincorporated share of the \$0 request for a total of \$240,970. The FY11 Adopted Millage Rate remains flat at 1.7320 with the FY10 Millage Rate of 1.7320.

Clearwater: The FY11 split is 87.91% incorporated and 12.09% unincorporated. Using the unincorporated percentage of 12.09% applied against the District request of \$18,402,691, the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$2,224,890. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$773,190 (includes a FY10 Board Resolution of \$54,500 adopted on July 13th, 2010), plus the unincorporated share of the \$418,740 request (12.09% times \$3,463,490 or \$418,740) for a total of \$1,191,930. This includes a millage increase to the FY11 Adopted Millage Rate of 2.1385 from the FY10 Millage Rate of 1.8628.

Dunedin: The FY11 split is 86.88% incorporated and 13.12% unincorporated. Using the unincorporated percentage of 13.12% applied against the District request of \$5,613,701, the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$736,520. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$0 plus the unincorporated share of the \$0 request for a total of \$0. The FY11 Adopted Millage Rate remains flat at 2.0102 with the FY10 Millage Rate of 2.0102.

Gandy: The FY11 split is 99.64% incorporated and 0.36% unincorporated. Using the unincorporated percentage of 0.36% applied against the District request of \$31,491,582, the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$113,370 plus \$5,000 (Fire Inspection Services) for a total of \$118,370. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$75,390 plus the unincorporated share of the \$0 request for a total of \$75,390. This includes a millage increase to the FY11 Adopted Millage Rate of 2.1594 from the FY10 Millage Rate of 1.3143.

Largo: The FY11 split is 83.05% incorporated and 16.95% unincorporated. Using the unincorporated percentage of 16.95%, applied against the District request of \$10,500,834 the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$1,779,890. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$60,740 (includes a FY10 Board Amendment #9 for \$60,740 adopted on July 13, 2010), plus the unincorporated share of the \$195,490 request (16.95% times \$1,153,333 or \$195,490) for a total of \$256,230. This includes a millage increase to the FY11 Adopted Millage Rate of 3.4384 from the FY10 Millage Rate of 2.4416.

FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICTS

Pinellas Park: The FY11 split is 88.74% incorporated and 11.26% unincorporated. Using the unincorporated percentage of 11.26% applied against the District request of \$6,427,842, the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$723,780. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$0 plus the unincorporated share of the \$0 request for a total of \$0. The FY11 Adopted Millage Rate remains flat at 2.3675 with the FY10 Millage Rate of 2.3675.

Safety Harbor: The FY11 split is 94.07% incorporated and 5.93% unincorporated. Using the unincorporated percentage of 5.93% applied against the District request of \$3,127,322, the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$185,450. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$186,540 plus the unincorporated share of the \$0 request for a total of \$186,540. This includes a millage increase to the FY11 Adopted Millage Rate of 2.6800 from the FY10 Millage Rate of 2.4252.

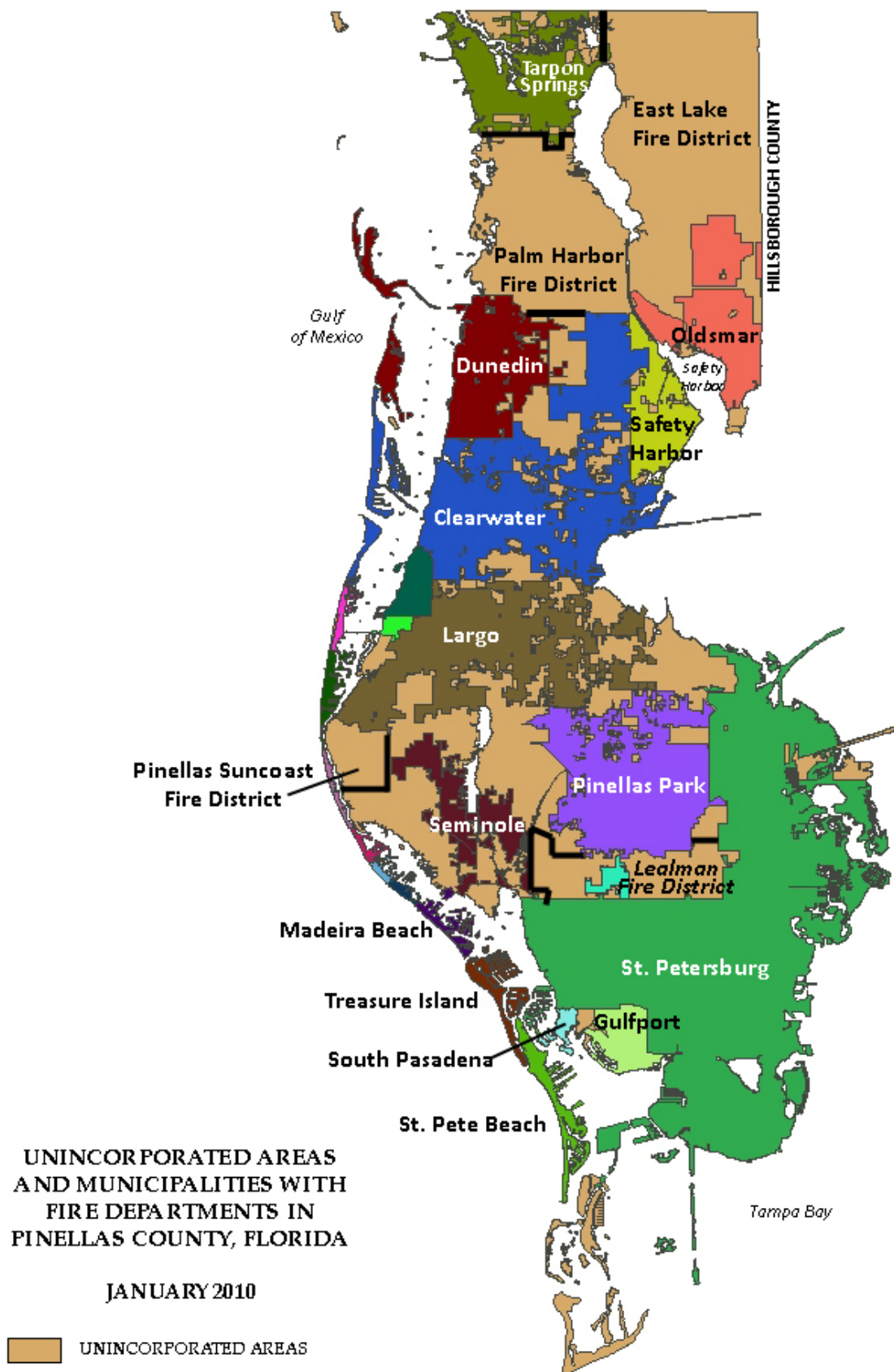
Tarpon Springs: The FY11 split is 90.05% incorporated and 9.95% unincorporated. Using the unincorporated percentage of 9.95% applied against the District request of \$4,457,569, the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$443,530. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$98,680 (includes a FY10 Budget Resolution of \$66,090 adopted on June 1st, 2010), plus the unincorporated share of the \$34,300 request (9.95% times \$344,733 or \$34,300) for a total of \$132,980. The FY11 Adopted Millage Rate remains flat at 2.3745 with the FY10 Millage Rate of 2.3745.

Seminole: The FY11 split is 28.37% incorporated and 71.63% unincorporated. Using the unincorporated percentage of 71.63% applied against the District request of \$5,387,400, the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$3,858,990. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$1,109,420 (includes a FY10 Budget Resolution of \$78,230 adopted on June 15th, 2010), plus the unincorporated share of the \$184,110 request (71.63% times \$257,030 or \$184,110) for a total of \$1,293,530. The FY11 Adopted Millage Rate remains flat at 1.9581 with the FY10 Millage Rate of 1.9581.

High Point: The FY11 split is 0% incorporated and 100% unincorporated. Applied against the District request of \$2,943,401, the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$2,535,420. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$52,640 plus the unincorporated share (100%) of \$0 request for a total of \$52,640. This includes a millage increase to the FY11 Adopted Millage Rate of 3.2644 from the FY10 Millage Rate of 2.7275.

Tierra Verde: The FY11 split is 0% incorporated and 100% unincorporated. As of the FY10 Budget, Tierra Verde contracts with Lealman for Fire Protection Services. The contract District request of \$1,192,985 becomes the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies' budgeted payment of \$1,192,990. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$54,420 plus the unincorporated share (100%) of the \$90,000 request (100% times \$90,000 or \$90,000) for a total of \$144,420. This includes a millage increase to the FY11 Adopted Millage Rate of 1.7382 from the FY10 Millage Rate of 1.3997.

South Pasadena: The FY11 split is 77.93% incorporated and 22.07% unincorporated. Using the unincorporated percentage of 22.07% applied against the District request of \$1,430,275, the FY11 Aid to Government Agencies will be \$315,660. The FY11 Reserve for Future Years will be the existing \$227,480, plus the unincorporated share of \$0 request for a total of \$227,480. The FY11 Adopted Millage Rate remains flat at 2.2188 with the FY10 Millage Rate of 2.2188.



GENERAL GOVERNMENT

Description

General Government is a non-departmental category which aggregates and allocates county-wide funding needs that benefit all departments and agencies, as well as unincorporated area (MSTU) expenditures that are not attributable to specific departments. The following significant items are included: tax increment financing payments, debt service costs, General Fund BCC departments technology system costs, miscellaneous government costs, County memberships in organizations, a Service Level Stabilization account, and General Fund reserves.

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Analysis

Excluding Reserves, Transfers and the Service Level Stabilization Account, the FY11 General Government Budget reflects a decrease of \$10,640,990 or 24.1% from the FY10 Revised Budget. Total reserves for FY11 are budgeted at \$94,100,000, including a contingency of approximately 5% of operating resources for both county-wide and MSTU functions.

The FY10 Budget included a \$2.0 million transfer to the Employee Health Benefits Fund for Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB); a \$2.2 million transfer to establish the new Building and Development Review Services (BDRS) Fund and support operations not covered by departmental revenues; \$1.5 million to complete the SRI project; a \$1.3 million transfer to the Capital Projects Fund for facilities energy and conservation projects; and \$1.0 million for Homeless Initiatives.

In addition to ongoing interfund transfers to the Community Development and BDRS Funds for operations and to the Employee Health Benefits Fund for OPEB, the FY11 Budget includes a \$4.9 million transfer to the Capital Projects Fund for facilities energy and conservation projects; \$600,000 in working capital for the STARS program and Arts Council; and \$1.0 million for Homeless Initiatives.

Unincorporated area (MSTU) activities budgeted here are operating support for the East Lake Community Library, and reappropriation of recreation grants which were carried forward from prior years.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Description

The Pinellas County Health Department promotes, protects, and improves the health and safety of our community through public and private partnerships in an environment that respects diversity. Programs include disease prevention, health promotion, diagnosis and treatment of disease, and environmental monitoring. Clinical services of the Health Department include child health, maternity, family planning, refugee screening, communicable disease services, and dental. Services are available at centers located in St. Petersburg, Pinellas Park, Largo, Clearwater, and Tarpon Springs. The local portion of Pinellas County Health Department budget is funded by a county-wide ad valorem tax levy.

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Analysis

The FY11 Budget reflects a decrease of \$819,670 or 17.4% from the FY10 Revised Budget. Excluding reserves, the FY10 budget reflects a decrease of \$444,650 or 9.4%. The \$4.3 million Grants and Aids contribution to the Pinellas County Health Department is funded by a county-wide property tax levy approved by the Board of County Commissioners. The FY10 ad valorem tax levy is 0.0622 mills. This results in a decrease of \$444,650 in Grants and Aids. A decrease of \$358,580 in Reserves maintains a 8.8% level which is consistent with the 5% - 15% target of gross proceeds to provide the working capital to sustain operational requirements of the Health Department.

LEALMAN SOLID WASTE COLL & DISPOSAL DIST

Description

This cost center accounts for the revenues and operating expenditures associated with the Lealman Municipal Service Business Unit (MSBU). The Lealman MSBU was established to provide for the residential waste collection and disposal services within the unincorporated Lealman area. A non-ad-valorem special assessment is levied on Lealman MSBU property owners' tax bills annually to provide funding for these services.

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Analysis

The FY11 Budget increased by \$6,710 or 0.4%. There were no program reductions for FY11.

Operating Expenses increased \$67,510 or 5.7%. The Transfer amount, \$24,000, is the Tax Collector's fee for collecting the revenues as calculated by statutory formula. Reserves decreased \$62,070 or 21.4%.

MEDICAL EXAMINER

Description

The Medical Examiner safeguards the rights of each citizen who dies in Pinellas County by determining the cause and manner of death according to the responsibilities and obligations in Chapter 406, Florida Statutes. The Medical Examiner Department provides both forensic medicine service (investigation of sudden, unexpected or suspicious death) and forensic laboratory service (chemical and drug analyses) to Pinellas County on a contractual basis. A DNA lab, which will operate within the forensic laboratory, will process DNA evidence in criminal cases. The lab is fully operational and accredited to allow the lab to index samples against the national DNA database.

Goals & Objectives

- * Continue monitoring the scope of drug related deaths for statewide reporting.
- * Continue violent death scene response to ensure first hand case information is available to Medical Examiner.
- * Forensic laboratory personnel will provide timely and accurate service in the analysis of seized drugs; DUI, sexual assault and post mortem toxicological specimens; and, fire debris.
- * Forensic Laboratory personnel will continue to serve the national forensic community in developing, monitoring, and managing quality assurance standards and analytical methods.
- * Both divisions will continue outreach educational program to schools, civic groups, law enforcement, the judicial system, universities and medical personnel.

PALM HARBOR COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICT

Description

The Palm Harbor Community Services District is a special taxing district whose boundaries mirror the the Palm Harbor Fire District within unincorporated Pinellas County. The residents established the special taxing district for the purpose of providing recreation and library facilities, programs, and services to the residents of Palm Harbor. These facilities, programs, and services are funded by ad valorem taxes and through other sources within the district that are not reflected as part of the county budget. Property owners within the district are levied a separate millage for this purpose.

Goals & Objectives

The library will provide for effective organizational management, adequate staffing, and development and training to advance library services.

The library will provide an array of cultural, educational and recreational programs and services.

The library will make a conscious commitment to embrace and implement relevant new technology and trends.

The library will further develop library and community partnerships.

The recreation district will continue to provide a high level of community activities and programs: Adult Active, Adult Passive, Youth, Support Services and Special Events.

The recreation district will continue to maintain and operate 6 public parks, 3 recreation centers, and 2 middle school athletic areas.

The library and recreation districts will actively market their resources to the community.

Excluding Reserves, the FY11 Budget reflects a decrease of \$418,750 or 21.9% from the FY10 Revised Budget. This reduction is primarily due to the 34.3% reduction in the Library program and its completion of its building renovations. The 10.8% reduction in ad valorem revenue resulted in a corresponding decrease in payments to the Palm Harbor Community Services Agency (PHCSA). The overall reserves for the Palm Harbor Recreation and Library Fund are \$78,830 or 5.0% of the total resources of the fund.

PUBLIC LIBRARY COOPERATIVE

Description

The Pinellas Public Library Cooperative (PPLC) serves eligible residents of Pinellas County and its member public libraries. The Cooperative serves these groups through the management of county, state and federal funds for library development and by facilitating the sharing of materials and resources among its members. The Cooperative is funded by a millage levy in a portion of the unincorporated areas of the county and per capita dues paid by the participating municipalities without libraries.

Goals & Objectives

- * Continue service to members of the public who require adapted library service through the Talking Book Library and the Deaf Literacy Center.
- * Continue support of the PPLC Born to Read program.
- * Continue support of Deaf Literacy Centers at Palm Harbor, Pinellas Park, Safety Harbor and St. Petersburg.
- * Coordinate the purchase of and access to electronic resources.
- * Continue resource sharing activities through delivery systems and regional reciprocal borrowing programs.
- * Continue to pursue grant opportunities at the local, state, and federal level.
- * Continue outreach activities to actively promote the Cooperative and its programs.
- * Coordinate the joint countywide automation system and serve as the contracting agency.

Excluding Reserves, the FY11 Budget reflects a decrease of \$495,190 or 9.0% from the FY10 Revised Budget. This decrease parallels the decrease in ad valorem collections; hence, a decrease in Grants & Aids to the cooperative's member libraries by \$482,370 or 9.0%. Operating Expenses reflect a decrease of \$6,330 or 15.8% in full cost allocation charges. Transfers to the Tax Collector decreased \$6,490 or 6.2%.

RISK FINANCING LIABILITY / WORKERS COMP

Description

Risk Financing for Liability and Workers Compensation provides the appropriation for the following types of insurance claims: vehicle, general liability, property and equipment, miscellaneous claims and settlement, medical benefits and workers compensation. The costs for the various risk programs are self-funded through an internal service fund. Risk Finance Administration is responsible for the administration of these funds. The administration budget is considered part of the County Administrator's operating budget.

Excluding Reserves, the FY11 Budget reflects a decrease of \$1,334,360 or 9.3% under the FY10 Revised Budget. Personal Services remains flat for expected Workers Compensation costs. Operating Expenses reflects a decrease of \$1,334,360 or 9.3%, primarily due to a 14% decrease in insurance premiums. Reserves increase to meet accrued liability requirements.

STREET LIGHTING DISTRICTS

Description

Street Lighting services for property owners in unincorporated areas of Pinellas County are provided through neighborhood area self-funded Districts. Street Lighting Districts are created in the unincorporated areas of Pinellas County when 60% or more of the affected property owners in a given area petition the Board of County Commissioners to form a District. All lighting services within the Districts are currently provided by Progress Energy Corporation. All property owners in these Districts are assessed annually based on their pro-rata share of the costs of operation and maintenance of the District's lighting system.
