- Trailers, single axle \$10.00 per load

SOLID WASTE MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of Pinellas County Utilities Solid Waste Operations is to provide safe, competitive, and environmentally sound integrated solid waste services to all citizens of Pinellas County. These services emphasize public awareness and communication to enable our citizens to make educated choices concerning proper management of their solid waste. Our integrated system includes: recycling drop-off centers, yard waste recycling, a household electronics and chemical collection program, used motor oil recycling, business recycling programs, a reef construction program, public outreach programs, a Waste-to-Energy facility, and a sanitary landfill. The knowledge and proper use of these services will help maintain the quality of life in Pinellas County.



INTRODUCTION

Pinellas County residents and businesses discard more than one million tons of solid waste every year. The primary goal of Solid Waste Operations is to responsibly dispose of this waste in the most environmentally safe manner. To meet this challenge, the county uses an integrated system with a combination of methods to manage the municipal waste stream. This approach includes waste reduction, recycling, the conversion of waste to electricity, and environmentally sensitive landfilling. This booklet is designed to help you learn more about each of these methods, along with providing an overview of the diverse programs that comprise the Pinellas County Utilities Solid Waste Operations.

OPERATIONS OVERVIEW

Pinellas County Utilities runs on an enterprise system, which means it operates like a business. Solid Waste Operations provides services to you while being funded solely through user disposal fees, capacity payments from Progress Energy of Florida, and the sale of electricity and recovered metals.

Solid Waste Operations is located at the 705-acre Bridgeway Acres site. The components of Solid Waste's multi-faceted program include a weigh scale complex, a Waste-to-Energy (WTE) facility with two steam-driven generators, an ash processing facility, a municipal solid waste (Class I) landfill, a bulky waste/construction and demolition debris (Class III) landfill, a yard waste recycling area, a household electronics and chemical collection center (HEC₃), a recycling drop-off site, and associated environmental management facilities.

Additional services include an on-site Inspection and Safety Unit, and an extensive public education program promoting residential and commercial recycling and waste reduction. Solid Waste Operations also has various off-site programs including a reef construction program, recycling drop-off centers, mobile household electronics and chemical collection events, and mulch pick-up sites. These services exist to maintain and improve the quality of life in Pinellas County, but it takes your participation to help realize that goal.

WASTE REDUCTION AND RECYCLING PROGRAMS

Recycling, in addition to saving natural resources, saves money by recovering materials that can be remanufactured into new products. Pinellas County's recycling program was implemented in 1989 in response to the State of Florida's 1988 Solid Waste Management Act. The key component of its success has been a strong awareness of, and commitment to, resource conservation by our citizens, businesses, and municipalities. Pinellas County works cooperatively with its cities, schools, homeowners, and businesses to assess waste streams and to increase participation by recommending personalized methods to reduce and recycle waste, and cut disposal costs.

RECYCLING DROP-OFF CENTERS

Approximately one-third of the waste disposed at Pinellas County's Solid Waste Operations facility is paper. Recycling not only saves energy and natural resources, it also conserves



the county's limited disposal capacity for those materials that cannot be recycled. With this in mind, the county operates drop-off recycling centers where citizens can recycle newspapers, cardboard, mixed paper, plastic bottles and aluminum cans. These are in addition to the curbside and drop-off recycling programs offered by many municipalities and private haulers. Information

YARD WASTE RECYCLING

The yard waste-to-mulch program began in 1990 to handle segregated yard waste, which consists of tree trimmings, grass clippings, palm fronds, and soft timber. This yard waste is delivered by private contractors, municipalities, and homeowners to the mulching area where it is ground to a usable size. The mulch is then monitored for temperature, oxygen, and moisture content for a minimum of 45 days, following the University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Science's established protocol. This sterilization process kills weed seeds, plant pathogens, and harmful insects, thus producing a high-quality product for public distribution. The program recycles approximately 20,000 tons of mulch per year. The processed mulch is distributed to 20 sites around the county (including many county and city parks) where it is available for pick up at no charge. Truckloads of mulch can also be picked up at the Bridgeway Acres site.



ELECTRONICS AND CHEMICAL WASTE DIVERSION PROGRAM

These items are not only toxic to the environment but also can be hazardous to your health. The program has five varied components to ensure the safe disposal of these potentially unsafe materials:

The **Household Electronics and Chemical Collection Center (HEC₃)** is a permanent drop-off center for electronic equipment and household chemical waste generated by residents of Pinellas County. There is no charge for residents. For a complete list of accepted waste, visit our Web site or call (727) 464-7500 for a free brochure.

NOTE:

The HEC₃ does not accept business-generated waste, household appliances, radioactive waste, biomedical waste, fire extinguishers, propane tanks, vehicle batteries, smoke detectors, guns/ammunition, or explosives. The **Swap Shop** exists to encourage reuse of selected household chemical products collected at the HEC₃. These reusable products are available to the public at no charge. Materials available in the Swap Shop typically include aerosol and latex paints, household cleaners, automotive fluids, and dry wall and plastering supplies. The type and amount of material available varies from day to day.

The **EnviroBusiness Days** waste collection program was developed to meet the disposal needs of businesses that are not large enough to qualify for federal hazardous waste disposal identification but are still required to dispose of it properly. Once each quarter, Pinellas County hosts an EnviroBusiness Days waste collection event at the HEC₃. Except for these collections, the HEC₃ is limited to non-business individuals. Businesses pay the independent contractors directly, at the county's reduced contract prices.

The **Mobile Collection** component of the Electronics and Chemical Waste Diversion Program provides collection events at various locations throughout the county. Mobile collections are held through EnviroPartnerships between Solid Waste Operations and requesting cities, retailers, and the School Board. Residential waste is accepted at no charge, and business waste is accepted for a fee paid directly to the contractors. The types and quantities of materials accepted at mobile events are the same as those for the HEC₃. Pinellas County typically holds 15-20 mobile collection events each year. Mobile collections are held Saturdays from 9 a.m. – 2 p.m. The schedule for mobile collection events is available at www.pinellascounty.org/utilities/mobile.htm.





The **Haz-to-Go** trailer is a self-contained mobile unit equipped for small local electronics and chemical collections. This unit was designed to serve homeowner associations, mobile home parks, and other similar small groups or communities. Events last for two hours and take place on Wednesdays and Saturdays. USED MOTOR OIL RECYCLING

Americans dump millions of gallons of used motor oil in garbage cans, sewers, and backyards every year. Oil doesn't wear out; it just gets dirty as it circulates through a car's engine. Re-refining used motor oil is a relatively simple process that leads to decreased dependence on foreign oil supplies, and helps protect our environment from pollution. To encourage oil recycling, EnviroPartner recycling sites are located throughout Pinellas County. In an effort to help protect the environment, these business partners accept used oil from the public free of charge. Many auto parts stores and service stations, including all AutoZone and Advance Auto Parts stores are participating locations. Used oil should be placed in one-quart or one-gallon plastic containers. Care is recommended because mixing other automotive fluids or water with the oil leaves it unsuitable for recycling. COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL BUSINESS RECYCLING

The Business **Cutting Waste at Work** Program provides information on how businesses can reduce waste, increase recycling, and buy supplies with recycled content. Solid Waste Operations personnel provide technical assistance to local businesses in the implementation or enhancement of their

recycling and waste reduction programs. The program also demonstrates environmental stewardship through waste reduction, water conservation, energy efficiency, and recycling. An awards program exists to recognize the waste reduction and recycling efforts of area businesses.

Pinellas County has a paper-recycling program for government offices and facilities, along with an extensive program within the school district to conduct waste assessments in the schools, to offer continuing education to the students and staff, and to manage a classroom paper-recycling program.

REEF CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM

Pinellas County operates one of the largest ongoing reef construction programs in the United States. By recycling the concrete debris from construction and demolition projects, along with such stunning structures as barges, decommissioned ships, and U.S. Army tanks, thriving fish and coral habitats are created. The department maintains more than a dozen offshore reefs in water depths ranging from 25 to 130 feet. It has also constructed 26 inshore reefs in conjunction with the Pinellas County Division of Coastal Management to enhance environmentally sensitive coastal areas impacted by beach restoration projects. Sea life flourishes on these new reefs, benefiting the surrounding Gulf waters. The structures at the reef sites are designed to attract various species of ocean life, providing some of the best diving and fishing in West Central Florida.



PUBLIC OUTREACH AND AWARENESS

Our goal is to stay connected with our residents, so together we can continue to enjoy a clean and beautiful place to live and work. That is why Pinellas County provides solid waste and recycling information through area schools, various community events, exhibits, presentations, speeches, and tours. Trained staff

members are available for speeches on reuse and recycling programs, waste reduction techniques, and all other areas of interest, including the reef construction program. Presentations and information suitable for use with children in the classroom are also available; visit www.pinellascounty.org/utilities/teachers. Tours of the solid waste facility, including the WTE facility, are available by appointment during regular working hours. These services are provided to the public at no charge.

SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL FACILITIES

SCALEHOUSE

The scalehouse complex consists of three inbound scales and one outbound scale. Each scale is capable of weighing vehicles up to 120,000 pounds. Approximately 800 to 1,000 vehicles use the facility each day. The scalehouse weighs vehicles delivering household and business waste, construction and demolition debris, and yard waste. This site does not accept bulk liquids, chemicals, hazardous waste, explosives, or waste from outside of Pinellas County. Scale attendants have the authority to request the inspection of suspect loads. The uniform tipping fee of

\$37.50 per ton was established in 1989 and is one of the lowest in the state. Unmodified passenger vehicles qualify for a flat rate of \$2 per load. Pickup trucks, passenger vans, and single axle trailers are \$10 per load. Payments can be made in cash, or with a personal or company check.



HAND UNLOAD AREA

The hand unload area is a location where the public can unload solid waste from smaller vehicles, avoiding the larger trucks at the landfill and on the WTE facility's tipping floor. The unloading area is designed to make it easier and safer for customers to drop off their waste. Two spaces are reserved for unloading metals, which are removed for recycling.



INSPECTION PAD (OR HOT PAD)

We know money and other valuables are sometimes accidentally thrown away. If you contact your hauler in time and the specific truck can be identified, that truck is directed to the inspection pad, where its contents are set aside and you can search for that missing treasure. The fee for this service is \$100, which is paid to the landfill contractor for pick up and disposal after the search.

Occasionally a solid waste collection truck may arrive with its load on fire (caused by chemical reactions in its load). Should this occur, the inspection pad earns its nickname, the "Hot Pad", by being the area where the load is dumped, spread out, and the fire extinguished. This area is also the location where vehicles are directed for random and periodic inspections performed in accordance with Florida law.

WASTE-TO-ENERGY FACILITY



The Waste-to-Energy facility began commercial operation in 1983 with two combustion units or boilers. In 1986, a third unit was added to meet the growing demands of Pinellas County.

Three overhead cranes feed the boilers from the nearby refuse pit. This area, measuring 240 feet long, 55 feet wide,

and 35 feet deep, is capable of storing three days worth of garbage. Each crane is capable of lifting six tons of garbage per grab. The boilers, among the largest in the United States, are each capable of burning 1,050 tons of solid waste each day. Pressurized steam created from the combustion process turns turbine generators that create electricity. The facility can produce up to 75 megawatts of electricity per hour and sells about 60 megawatts of electricity per hour to Progress Energy of Florida, which distributes it back into the community. The remaining power generated is used to power the facility itself. The county receives revenues of over \$25 million dollars annually from the sale of power and capacity payments to Progress Energy Florida.

After retrofitting the facility in 2000, and updating it in 2003, to improve on its already stringent environmental controls, it now meets or exceeds all Federal and State requirements for air pollution controls. The approximate cost of the retrofit was \$90 million dollars. Additionally, the county invested over \$55 million in other capital improvement projects to the facility, increasing efficiency, and extending the life of the facility. All of the work was paid for with reserve money, eliminating the need to increase tipping fees.



MATERIALS RECOVERY SYSTEM

The Materials Recovery System is located immediately adjacent to the WTE facility. This is where the metals that have survived the combustion process are separated from the facility ash, shredded, and sorted using magnets and eddy currents. The recovered metals are sold to steel mills and smelters for recycling. This revenue is shared between the county and the facility contractor.

SANITARY LANDFILL

The Bridgeway Acres Landfill consists of two separate landfill areas. The Class I landfill is for the disposal of the unusable remains of the WTE facility's combustion process. It is also for backup disposal when the WTE facility's boilers are not functioning, or the facility is unable to store all incoming solid waste. The Class III landfill area handles construction and demolition debris, large bulky items, and other inert material that cannot be burned.



The Bridgeway Acres facility is a valuable asset to the county. Maintaining two separate landfill areas allows greater flexibility in managing solid waste by extending the useful life of the site and providing improved environmental conditions. Recent calculations project the landfill's life through at least the year 2043. This facility affords the county full control over its solid waste management systems. It also provides substantial savings to the county and its municipalities by avoiding the high cost of hauling and disposing of waste at a distant, out-of-county location.

ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT PROGRAMS

One of Solid Waste Operations' primary responsibilities is to meet or exceed all environmental rules and regulations, and to be a good neighbor to nearby residents and businesses. As a result, a substantial investment has been made in environmental management facilities and monitoring.

INSPECTION AND SAFETY UNIT

The Inspection and Safety Unit provides site security, traffic control, load inspections, accident investigations, and employee and customer injury investigations. They inspect approximately 600 commercial collection vehicles per month for prohibited or hazardous materials including chemicals, biomedical waste, and mercury-containing devices.



The unit also oversees five random, in-depth commercial load inspections per week. This requires the solid waste to be thoroughly examined for prohibited or hazardous materials. If any material of this nature is found, a follow-up investigation is conducted to determine the proper response.

GROUNDWATER MANAGEMENT

A major concern at any solid waste management facility is safeguarding groundwater resources. A comprehensive monitoring and pumping system allows Solid Waste Operations to manage all onsite groundwater, maintaining isolation of the landfill from other waters, an essential part of environmentally safe landfilling practices. The Bridgeway Acres site has natural geologically protective features. A naturally occurring underground clay layer, which is part of the Hawthorne Formation, acts like the bottom of a bathtub. The "sides" of this bathtub are made up of a subsurface Bentonite clay slurry wall.



The combination of the clay layer and slurry wall form an impermeable barrier around the Bridgeway Acres landfill, preventing groundwater from leaving the site.

SURFACE WATER MANAGEMENT

The site's primary surface water management facility is Pond A, covering an area of approximately 65 acres. All waters on the facility, including any water accumulated through rainfall and stormwater runoff, are directed to Pond A from a series of connected canals, ditches, and ponds. In order to conserve water resources, water from Pond A is pumped to the Waste-to-Energy facility for use in the facility's cooling tower. Approximately 1,000 gallons per minute of water is pumped from Pond A to supply the facility with 1.5 million gallons of water per day. The backup water supply of reclaimed water is only used when Pond A water is not available.

MONITORING PROGRAM

Driving by the Bridgeway Acres facility, you may see the result of the evaporation of water running through the facility's cooling towers in the form of rising steam. Solid Waste Operations maintains an extensive monitoring program at the WTE facility, equipped with continuous emissions monitors. Regular stack testing is performed to assure full compliance with all air pollution control regulations. The site includes over 40 groundwater monitoring wells, as well as a number of surface water monitoring locations. These monitoring points are checked on a daily, weekly, and/or monthly basis for compliance with permit and regulatory conditions.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQS)



Why do I have to pay if I'm a resident of Pinellas County?

The disposal facility operates solely on service fees charged at the scales, and other facility-generated revenues. Solid Waste Operations does not receive any money through the county's general fund or any share of money collected for waste collection and disposal by the municipalities other than tipping fees.

Where can I pick up mulch and how much does it cost?

The mulch processing area at Solid Waste Operations is open Monday through Friday from 6:30 a.m. – 4 p.m. for trucks and trailers that can be loaded with a front-end loader. There are 19 other locations throughout the county where smaller quantities of mulch can be picked up. All mulch is absolutely FREE, but be sure to bring your own container and shovel for loading, and a tarp to cover the load during transport. Visit www.pinellascounty.org/utilities/mulch-sites.htm.

Why is the deposit so high when I have only a few dollars worth of trash?

Deposits are set according to the gross weight of the loaded vehicle and the type of material. The deposit is 40% of the loaded vehicle weight and 60% for non-combustible waste.

How can I establish an account for disposal?

Charge accounts for businesses and individuals can be secured with a letter of credit from the bank, cash escrow, or surety bond from a bonding company. An account can be opened at the Administration Building, across from the scalehouse, at 3095 114th Ave. N., St. Petersburg.

Is there a senior citizen discount?

There are no senior citizen discounts.

What is the fee to drop off my household chemicals or electronic waste at the Household Electronics & Chemical Collection Center?

This is a FREE service for household waste generated by the residents of Pinellas County. You can also pick up materials you may need for home-based projects at no charge.

What should I do with old tires?

Tires are accepted during normal operating hours and may only come from residents and businesses located in Pinellas County. Tires must be less than 45 inches in diameter. If over 45 inches, tires must be cut in half or quarters. Normal disposal rates apply.

How do I dispose of my business' chemical waste or electronics?

Call Solid Waste Operations at (727) 464-7500 Monday through Friday between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. for information on quarterly business hazardous electronic & chemical waste collections. Business hazardous electronic & chemical waste is also accepted for a fee at any of the household mobile collection events. Visit www.pinellascounty.org/bizwaste.

How do I dispose of my business' process waste?

Call Solid Waste Operations at (727) 464-7500 and ask to speak to the special waste section. Depending on the nature of the waste, you may be able to get approval to dispose of it in the landfill. Business process waste may not be mixed with regular trash without prior approval.

Why is it sometimes necessary to dump combustible trash in the landfill?

Combustible trash is sometimes diverted to the landfill to avoid an overload of material to the Waste-to-Energy facility. Only so much volume of material can be burned per hour.

How do I get a tour of the Solid Waste facility?

Call Solid Waste Operations at (727) 464-7500 Monday through Friday between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Tours of the Waste-to-Energy facility are typically offered by appointment on Tuesday and Thursday from 9 a.m. – 3 p.m.

Why wasn't my trash picked up today?

Call your sanitation hauler for questions concerning this matter. Check your telephone book, your most recent bill, or the list on page 23 for your hauler's telephone number.

Who should I call if I see someone illegally dumping?

You should report it directly to the Police or Sheriff's Department.

Who do I call if I'm not sure how to dispose of something?

Call Solid Waste Operations at (727) 464-7500 Monday through Friday between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. You may also visit www.pinellascounty.org/utilities/getridofit for access to the online disposal guide used by the staff.

How do I find the nearest recycling drop-off center or recycling program?
