Dunedin Recycling

CURBSIDE RECYCLING:

See reverse for sample bin photo.



- aluminum cans
- glass bottles and jars (clear/no colors)
- mixed paper
- newspapers
- plastic bottles
- steel cans

To request a curbside bin, call the city at 298-3024.

YARD WASTE RECYCLING:

Place grass clippings and leaves in 32-gallon cans or bags (up to 50 lbs.). Cut brush materials into 4 ft. lengths and tie in bundles (up to 50 lbs.).

DROP OFF RECYCLING:

BUSINESS & MULTI-FAMILY RECYCLING:

Dunedin offers curbside cart recycling to businesses and multi-family buildings.

The service uses rolling carts to collect: aluminum and steel cans, clear glass (no colors), mixed paper, newspaper, or plastic bottles (*one item per cart*). For cardboard recycling, you can request a large commercial container. To sign up, call 298-3215, ext. 24.

RECYCLING GUIDELINES

NO PLASTIC BAGS PLEASE!

Aluminum Cans – Any empty aluminum can such as soda or juice cans. Rinse and crush if possible.

Cardboard – Clean, empty, dry corrugated (3-layer) cardboard boxes or packaging. Please flatten boxes. No pizza boxes.

Cell Phones – Any size, make, or model of cell phone (digital or analog), with or without battery or charger.

Electronics – Click here for a list of [electronic items that are hazardous](#).

Glass Bottles & Jars – Any empty glass jar or bottle (clear/no colors). Labels okay. No caps or lids.

Mixed Paper – Any clean, dry paper item that tears, such as white or colored paper, shredded paper, office paper, magazines, phone books, catalogs, junk mail & envelopes, wrapping paper, and paperboard items such as cereal boxes or paper towel rolls. No soiled or wax coated paper such as milk cartons.

Newspapers – Dry newspapers and inserts. No string or twine. It's okay to put inside a paper bag.

Plastic Bottles – Any empty plastic bottle with a “neck” (opening smaller than the base) such as water, soda, shampoo, or ketchup. No need to check for #1 or #2—just “check for a neck”. Bottles only; no tubs, cups, or bags. Labels okay. No caps or lids. Rinse and crush if possible.

Rechargeable Batteries – Nickel Cadmium (Ni-Cd), Nickel Metal Hydride (Ni-MH), Lithium Ion (Li-ion) and small sealed lead (Pb) weighing up to 2 lbs. each.

Steel (Tin) Cans – Any empty steel cans such as soup cans. Labels and lids okay. Rinse if possible.
